TANNER, a Deputy Real Estate Commissioner of 17 the State of California, for cause of Accusation against MICHAEL ANTHONY QUINTANA, 18 (Respondent), is informed and alleges as follows: 19 1 20 The Complainant makes this Accusation in her official capacity. 21 22 At all times herein mentioned, Respondent was and is presently licensed and/or 23 has license rights under the Real Estate Law, Part 1 of Division 4 of the California Business and 24 Professions Code (the Code) by the Bureau of Real Estate (the Bureau) as a real estate 25

salesperson.

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On or about August 14, 2012, in the Superior Court of the State of California, County of Santa Clara, Case No. C 1227398, Respondent was convicted of violating Section 484/488 of the California Penal Code (petty theft), a misdemeanor and a crime which bears a substantial relationship under Section 2910, Title 10, California Code of the Regulations (the Regulations), to the qualifications, functions, or duties of a real estate licensee.

On or about November 2, 2011, in the Superior Court of the State of California, County of Santa Clara, Case No. 1118939, Respondent was convicted of violating Section 242/243(e) of the California Penal Code (battery on spouse, cohabitant, etc), a misdemeanor and a crime which bears a substantial relationship under Section 2910 of the Regulations to the qualifications, functions, or duties of a real estate licensee.

The facts alleged in Paragraphs 3 and 4 above, constitute cause under Sections 490 (conviction of substantially related crime) and 10177(b) (further grounds for disciplinary action- conviction of crime) of the Code for suspension or revocation of all licenses and license rights of Respondent under the Real Estate Law.

Section 10106 of the Code provides, in pertinent part, that in any order issued in resolution of a disciplinary proceeding before the Bureau, the commissioner may request the administrative law judge to direct a licensee found to have committed a violation of this part to pay a sum not to exceed the reasonable costs of the investigation and enforcement of the case.

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WHEREFORE, Complainant prays that a hearing be conducted on the allegations of this Accusation and that upon proof thereof, a decision be rendered imposing disciplinary action against all licenses and license rights of Respondent under the Code, for the reasonable costs of investigation and prosecution of this case, including agency attorney's fees and for such other and further relief as may be proper under the provisions of law.
