STATEMENT OF ISSUES

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The Complainant, Maria Suarez, a Deputy Real Estate

Commissioner of the State of California, for Statement of Issues

against CHRISTOPHER BRYAN ARCO ("Respondent") alleges as follows:

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Respondent made application to the Department of Real Estate of the State of California for a real estate salesperson license on or about December 10, 2002, with the knowledge and understanding that any license issued as a result of said application would be subject to the conditions of Code Section 10153.4.

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Complainant, Maria Suarez, a Deputy Real Estate

Commissioner of the State of California, makes this Statement

of Issues in her official capacity.

III

On or about June 5, 1995, in the Municipal Court, Harbor Judicial District, County of Orange, State of California, Case No. IRH94M10376, Respondent was convicted of violating one count each of Section 23152(a) of the California Vehicle Code (VC) (Driving while under the influence of alcohol), and Section 23152(b) VC (Driving with BA over .08 and under .20 alcohol), crimes involving moral turpitude which are substantially related to the qualifications, functions and duties of a real estate licensee.

IV

On or about February 24, 1998, in the Municipal Court of the State of California, Harbor Judicial District Case

No. IRH97HM07057, Respondent was convicted of violating Section 484(a)-488 of the California Penal Code (Petty theft), a crime involving moral turpitude which is substantially related to the qualifications, functions and duties of a real estate licensee.

V

On or about December 18, 1996, in the Circuit Court of Hillsborough County, Florida, Case No. 96-5655, Respondent plead Nolo contendere to violating one count of Grand theft, third degree and seventeen (17) counts of Uttering forged instrument. It was ordered that an adjudication of guilty be

withheld. As a result, respondent was sentenced to probation of 60 months, ordered to pay restitution of \$14,000.00 and \$258.00 court cost. These were crimes involving moral turpitude which are substantially related to the qualifications, functions and duties of a real estate licensee.

VI

Respondent's convictions and plea of nolo contendere, as set forth in Paragraphs III through V, are cause to deny Respondent's real estate license application pursuant to Code Sections 480(a)(1) and 10177(b)

These proceedings are brought under the provisions of Section 10100, Division 4 of the Business and Professions Code of the State of California and Sections 11500 through 11528 of the Government Code.

wherefore, the Complainant prays that the aboveentitled matter be set for hearing and, upon proof of the
charges contained herein, that the Commissioner refuse to
authorize the issuance of, and deny the issuance of, a real
estate salesperson license to Respondent CHRISTOPHER BRYAN
ARCO, and for such other and further relief as may be proper in
the premises.
